Our doctors, nurses and scientists are advancing care for children with both rare and common diseases. Our breakthroughs in treating childhood cancer, congenital heart disease, fetal anomalies and many other diseases are saving lives and improving children's quality of life. Our committment to the whole child includes an expansion of mental health services as we strive to meet the challenges youth face today. We are just as devoted to keeping healthy children well and enhancing the well-being of entire families.

CHOP AND NEW JERSEY SHARE A COMMITMENT TO CHILDREN'S HEALTH

- Nearly 23% of patients admitted to CHOP are from the Garden State (6,906 admissions in fiscal year 2022).
- CHOP is the largest provider of inpatient care to sick children from New Jersey. Three of 10 pediatric hospital admissions for New Jersey residents occurred at CHOP (calendar year 2013*, excluding neonates). This is a significant increase from 9% in calendar year 2009.
- CHOP cares for a large number of New Jersey children with limited financial means. Nearly 27% of inpatients from New Jersey were covered by Medicaid.
- Every county in New Jersey sent children to CHOP for inpatient care in fiscal year 2022, led by Camden County with 905 and Burlington County with 843.

CHOP EMPLOYEES HAVE A POSITIVE FINANCIAL IMPACT IN NEW JERSEY

- 2,639 CHOP employees live in New Jersey.
- They earn nearly \$185 million in wages and contribute more than \$2.58 million in New Jersey state wage taxes (fiscal year year 2018).

CHOP'S TEACHING PROGRAMS ARE WORLD-RENOWNED

• CHOP has the largest and highest ranking (U.S. News & World Report 2023 ranking) pediatric residency training program in the country, with trainees in 81 accredited and non-accredited training programs, including 165 residents and 319 fellows (fiscal year 2022).

- In fiscal year 2022, more than 190,000 patient encounters occurred at N.J. primary and specialty care locations, including:
 - Specialty Care at Virtua, Voorhees: More than 18,000 patient visits
 - Specialty Care & Surgery Center, Voorhees: More than 24,000 specialty care visits; more than 2,000 outpatient surgeries; more than 5,000 imaging studies
 - Atlantic County Specialty Care Center: More than 5,000 specialty care visits
 - Princeton at Plainsboro Specialty Care Center: More than 20,000 specialty care visits
 - Primary Care Centers in Gibbsboro, Cape May, Smithville, Somers Point, Mount Laurel and Burlington Township: More than 121,000 primary care visits
 - Children's Intensive Emotional and Behavioral Services in Mays Landing (behaviorally focused partial day hospital services, including full-day and extended-day programs): 3,850 total visits

CHOP PROVIDES HIGHLY SPECIALIZED SERVICES FOR NEW JERSEY'S CHILDREN

- N.J. children have access to services that others travel many miles for. In fiscal year 2022, CHOP patients came from all 50 states, 66 foreign countries, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands.
- CHOP's high volume of patients enables the hospital to recruit and attract highly specialized physicians in many disciplines.
- CHOP pediatric services and multidisciplinary clinics not available at N.J. hospitals include:
 - Advanced Fetal Surgery
 - Chronic Lung Disease
 - Complex Congenital Heart Surgery
 - Hyperinsulinism Program
 - Proton Therapy (pediatric facility)
 - Thoracic Insufficiency Program
- CHOP received inpatient transports from 56 N.J. hospitals, representing 79% of all acute care hospitals in the state (fiscal year 2022). CHOP's transport capabilities ensure that all N.J. residents can access the best care when needed.
